Mrs Brady's sisters believe someone may have abducted her and dumped the remains of her body there recently.

Yesterday, Mr Brady said the news meant that the family would at last be able to come to terms with Winnie's death and bring her body home to Dublin to lay her to rest.

But one of the woman's sisters, Bernie Shevlin, 53, hit out at the Department of Foreign Affairs for failing to inform her that a body had been found, claiming that she was told about the discovery by a stranger on the street.

Her comments, however, are at odds with Mr Brady, who said he couldn't praise diplomats enough for keeping in touch with him.

On the day Mrs Brady went missing she had decided against joining her fellow pilgrims on an excursion due to her painful arthritis.

But when her friends returned to meet her at about 2 pm, a reception-

But when her friends returned to meet her at about 2pm, a reception-ist told them she had left the premises at around 1pm. Her pass-port, cash, cigarettes and medication

Possessions left in room untouched

remained untouched in her room, and she had made no withdrawals from her bank account.

Mr Brady, from the Kilbarrack area of north Dublin, said the Department had informed him of the discovery of a body on Sunday.

'I heard that they found the body. They weren't sure if it was Winnie or not. They were doing the post mortem during the night and said that as soon as they get the details they would get in touch with me,' he said.

'Yesterday morning the Department of Foreign Affairs were on to me and told me that they were nearly 98 per cent sure it was Winnie. The only identification was what she was wearing – her rings and that. When he (the official) mentioned the rings, they were the rings she had on her. Now I've just got the dental report and that's been faxed over to them.' He said that 'there were no words that could explain the feelings' he had felt during Winnie's disappearance.

'There are people in similar circumstances, and well, I pity them. I really do. My heart goes out to them. At least I have closure now and maybe I can rest easy now, knowing that I am bringing her home.

When asked what he thought had happened to his wife, he said: 'I'd be only speculating. I can't really tell. Until they give you the full details I won't know.'

He said she had been 'grand' before she left and 'really looking forward' to the pilgrimage.

There was nothing wrong with her except the knee, she had arthritis in the knee. That really was her only complaint otherwise she was grand. 'After five days over there she just disappeared and hasn't been seen



During the time she was missing, they were in touch with me all the time and kept me up to date with everything that was happening.' But yesterday Mrs Shevlin said she and her only remaining sister Dolores Flynn, 54, had been told about the discovery by a stranger on the street.

She said she was also furious that the Department had failed to keep in contact with them

since September 16 last in relation to Winnie's disappearance. She said they had asked the Department to keep them informed due to a breakdown in communications with Stephen. She told the Irish Dally Mail last night: 'Stephen rang me this morning at 11 o'clock but I'd already found out from a stranger on the street at 5 o'clock on Sunday afternoon that Winnie's body had been found.' She added: 'We don't know why he's being like this. It

with Mrs Brady's possessions on was like he was the husband and we shouldn't be interfering with them.

'We are Winnie's family, her flesh and blood and we have a right to know what is going on with our sister.'

But a spokesman for the Department of Foreign Affairs said yesterday: 'The Department's normal practise is to liaise with the next of kin, which in this case is Stephen Brady. And beyond that it is up to the family to liaise with each other.'

It is understood that Winnie is the seventh person to have dis-appeared in the region since 1981.

In October Mrs Brady's sisters insisted that her disappearance was 'not an accident'.

Mrs Flynn said: 'My sister and I believe that something sinister happened to Winnle.
